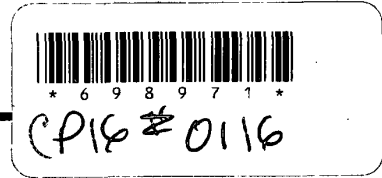

Hello Gordy,

I went on the link you provided to get an idea who these folks were. There were no names, but I assume you will have a list. The BERK people do their work pro-bono, just

like John Karpinski used to do. There's some pretty extensive and glitzy stuff in these reports. Are you sure they wrote them? As I read through it, it looks pretty much like the old conversations that staff has generated, for almost 20 years. Over those years, I've seen a lot of these discussions in other documents from the county. The one that concerns me is the one that says the agriculture areas should plan to re-aggregate (recombine) 5ac, 10ac, and 20 acre parcels to total 150 to 200 acres in the ag districts. That's right out of the 1993-94 comp plan proposals. In addition, there were other recommendations that would limit and prevent development in rural lands. In addition, your Rural Lands Report by BERK states there are numerous types of farmers in the county earning fairly high incomes. Neither one of these items is true. You must understand. There are no long term commercial agricultural or forest land of any significance, in Clark County.

You can't create something that isn't, and all the documents in the world will not change that. The USDA ag census clearly shows that 100% of the farm operators work hours off of the farm. Almost 90% of the income is less than \$10,000. Almost 90% of the farms are less than 50 acres and almost 100% of the operators do not work full time on the farm. The same would probably be true for forestry in the county, and I'm sure we could get that information.

With all due respect, this work that you have presented from these two groups will not work in Clark County. There's a lot of it that CCCU, Inc. could certainly support, especially the community outreach and education portions. But, all of this information in these documents is almost the same information that was presented in 1993-94 and continued through the years to today. It is time the planning department understands that they have court mandates to fulfill that have not been fulfilled to the satisfaction of those you must answer to. If I were you, I would throw all this old stuff out, and make a bright new document that fits the rural areas of Clark County and works well for it's people.

Commissioner Madore forwarded this e-mail and asked that we respond to it.

As a continuation of the Rural Lands Review (which began in 2009), the Board in 2011 approved a contract with BERK & Associates of Seattle, a private consulting firm. The contract was to 1) prepare a 'Situation Assessment' that looked at trends in agriculture and forest activities in the county, and 2) provide background for a transfer of development rights program (TDR) program, a recommendation that came both from the Agricultural Preservation Advisory
