November is rural citizens month. We want to hear from you as we do what the Growth Management Act requires us to do – responsibly plan for foreseeable growth.

We've received valuable feedback from citizens, our local cities, and experts that challenged us to consider their input to make our draft comprehensive plan better. You have been heard. Your improvements have been incorporated into our recipe, and it's time for our community to evaluate the cake before we put it into the oven and bake it.

Our County Council wants to hear from you before we make a decision on these, or accept or reject all or part of the previous draft.

Here's how you can learn more about these potential plans that will define how your property is zoned for the next 20 years.

November 5 at 6:30 pm - They were introduced to the Planning Commission with much discussion for nearly 2 hours.

November 9 from 1:30 – 3:30 pm - A Work Session with our Board, City Representatives, and local organizations will consider the proposed updates. The outcome from that meeting will move a proposal forward.

November 16 from 5:30 – 7:00 pm - An Open House at Hockinson High School will give citizens an opportunity to talk with us about it.

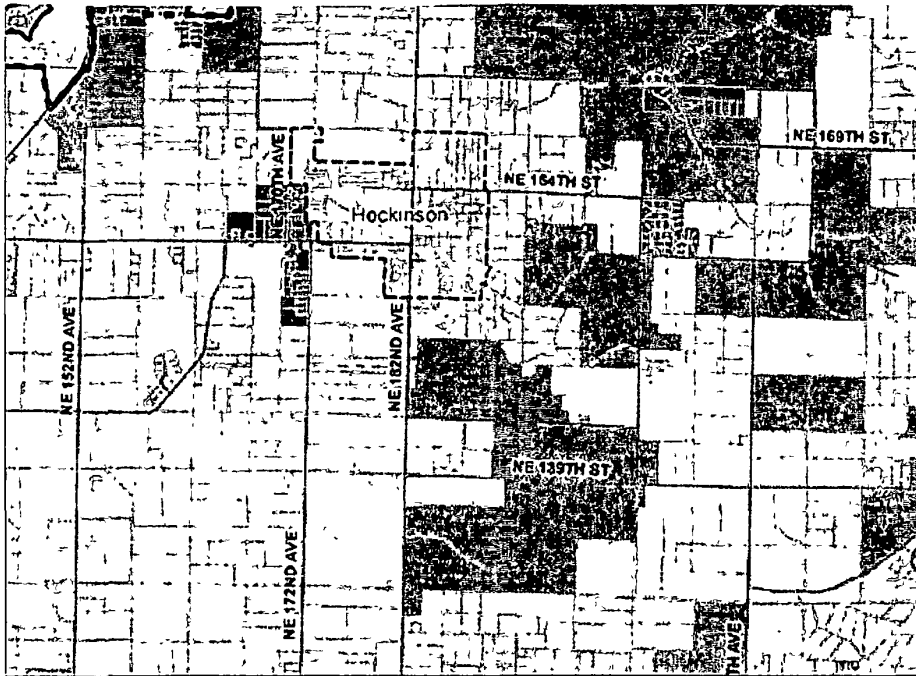
November 17 from 5:30 – 7:00 pm - Another Open House at Ridgefield High School will give citizens another opportunity to talk with us about it.

November 19 at 6:30 pm. The Planning Commission will conduct a hearing that welcomes citizens to give them feedback before they vote on their recommendation to the County Council.

November 24 at 10 am our County Council will conduct a hearing that welcomes citizens to give them feedback before we vote on the final plan and order the Final SEIS to get 'er done.

These plans affect your private property rights, the value of your land, and the future of our environment, our economy, and the long term prosperity of our community.

We've worked hard to ensure that our plans fully comply with the Growth Management Act. Before we bake that cake, be sure to let us know if we got the recipe just right. Thanks.
