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- Other improvements include:
- A 500-foot, gravel pedestrian trail segment running from East Avenue to West 7th Street
- An 1,100-foot gravel trail running from East 4th Street to an existing trail in Sternwheeler Park
- A 600-foot gravel trail running north of the Lewis River, along D Avenue then west along West 2nd Street and finally connecting to an existing trail on West E Avenue
- A short section of gravel trail on the west side of the La Center Road bridge connecting to an existing trail east of the bridge
- A new park on the east side of La Center Road, just south of the bridge. This park will have a gravel access road off Pollock Road and will have a gravel parking lot, gravel pedestrian walkway, grassy pedestrian area with picnic tables and barbecue pits, a future bathroom and a gravel

## Alternative 4 supporters invite the public to meeting

Meeting to take place Friday, Feb. 12 at Hockinson High

BRUSH PRAIRIE – Supporters of the preferred alternative to Clark County’s comprehensive growth management plan will meet at 7 p.m. Fri., Feb. 12 at Hockinson High School, 16819 in Brush Prairie

“Rally the troupes!” read an announcement from Clark County Citizens United, Inc., a local group lobbying in support of the Alternative 4 plan

Clark County Councilors approved the Alternative 4 implementation in late 2015 amid heavy controversy before the new 5-person council took office in January. As the new board examines recent council

decisions, the controversial Alternative 4 plan has floated to the top

Supporters of the plan are scrambling to sway local citizens in the wake of a recent report from RW Thorpe and Associates, an engineering firm tasked with examining the plan and the new set of planning assumptions it was based upon. That report found half of the new assumptions faulty, prompting opponents to call for Alternative 4 to be shelved until a new, more accurate plan can be adopted

“At the meeting, Alternative 4 supporters with CCCU will give a presentation and host a discussion with “other rural interest representatives” available for further conversation, according to a CCCU announcement
